## **World Science Festival**

CLCAC's Land & Environment Unit was invited to be part of the World Science Festival held at the Queensland Museum in Brisbane.

CLCAC participated in an expert panel on migratory shorebirds and joined leading researchers, scientists and senior government officers to discuss conservation of these threatened species.

Presentations were given by Phillip George (Normanton Ranger Coordinator), Thomas Wilson (Wellesley Island Ranger Coordinator) and Brenton Yanner (Gangalidda & Garawa Ranger Coordinator) on the work of their respective groups. A highlight of the Festival was the opportunity to meet with the Hon Leeanne Enoch – The Minister for Environment and the Great Barrier Reef, Science and Arts. CLCAC would like to thank the Minister for engaging with the migratory shorebird conservation initiatives driven by Traditional Owners in the lower Gulf. We would like to acknowledge the Department of Environment and Science and the Queensland Museum for their support.









# **Ranger Appoinments**

Congratulations to the following Normanton Ranger appointments of Phillip George as Ranger Coordinator and Lance Rapson as Head Ranger. We also congratulate Gangalidda & Garawa Ranger's Brenton Yanner as Ranger Coordinator and Desmond Armstrong as Head Ranger.

Phillip and Lance have been with the CLCAC since the inception of the Ranger Program in Normanton. During this time they have shown commitment to the organisation and contributed to the continual development of the Ranger Program to ensure the best outcomes are delivered on country. These efforts, particularly in the early stages, provided a pathway for the growth of the Normanton Rangers from the original 3 to 9 fulltime positions.

Brenton Yanner and Desmond Armstrong have shown great commitment and leadership qualities through their training and day to day adminstration in carrying out land and sea projects. Their aptitude to their work has been rewarded with their appointments. The Burketown based Rangers now total 12 fulltime positions.







# **Cultural Heritage Site**

The Gangalidda and Garawa Rangers have been hard at work in preparation for the wet season with the maintenance and protection of culturally significant sites.

Pastoral activity surrounding the important Woods Lake (Jilgura) site has resulted in serious erosion causing a burial ground to become exposed.

By strategically placing sandbags and rocks and constructing fencing, the rangers have temporarily protected the site from further damage. This project is still ongoing as options for more permanent protection are considered, especially with more rain on the way.





# **Drone Training**

The Gangalidda & Garawa and Normanton Ranger Groups recently participated in Remote Pilot Aircraft training.

Drones are a new technology that allow access to the sky at the touch of a button. High quality cameras can take photographs and videos whilst in the air. Live vision will allow the Rangers to access even the most remote parts of their country for animal surveying, biodiversity mapping and future project planning.

Following on from drone training the Gangalidda & Garawa Rangers put their new drone to good use conducting cast net surveys. The drone has been used to identify suitable flood crossings for the conduct of the surveys which are aimed at monitoring the region's aquatic biodiversity during the wet season.





# **Queensland Indigenous Land & Sea Ranger Forum**

On 20-22nd March 2018, Ganglidda & Garawa, Normanton and WILSSED Rangers together with CLCAC Operational Staff and Senior Management attended the annual QILSRP Ranger Worshop in Cairns.

Indigenous Ranger groups funded through Queensland Indigenous Land & Sea Ranger Program gathered to share their successes in land management & conservation and network with a number of government stakeholders, delegates and other Ranger groups. During the workshop, CLCAC was provided the opportunity to deliver two keynote addresses. This included a synopsis on the CLCAC 2017 Strategic Review which was presented by Rachel Amini-Yanner, CLCAC CEO and Murrandoo Yanner, CLCAC Director.

The second keynote address was presented by Terrence Taylor, Lead Instructor for the Jigija Indigenous Fire Training Program which provided an overview of the Jigija program and Terrence's transition from the Ranger Program to Business and Economic Development.

During a dedicated networking workshop block, CLCAC spent time with Fisheries Queensland, Department of Environment and Science (DES) and Department of Environment and Heritage Protection (EHP) as well as many others to discuss potential future collaborations towards positive on-country outcomes.

CLCAC looks forward to attending the next QILSRP workshop in 2019.



## Saltwater Marsh Conference

On 16th-20th April 2018 CLCAC were invited to attend The Australian Mangrove and Salt Marsh Conference held in Sydney Australia.

The conference attracted scientist focused on mangrove and salt marsh from across Australia and also international representaives, Government and Independent Consultants.

CLCAC's Rangers were the only Indigenous Ranger Group that attend the conference. As part of the conference Desmond Armstrong and Phillip George gave a presentation on mangroves and CLCAC's response to recent mangrove dieback in the southern Gulf of Carpentaria. As Traditional Owners, both Desmond and Phillip highlighted the multitude of ecosystem services that mangrove provide in the Gulf coastline and waterways and as such consider the health of mangroves to

be critically important to indigenous values as well.

The presentation received excellent feedback and led to a number of networking opportunities with conference attendees; notably CLCAC Rangers were able to continue discussions on the Mangrove Watch program with Dr Norm Duke and Jock Mackenzie who have been involved in previous CLCAC Ranger projects.

The Ranger groups look forward to future mangrove work.



## **Shorebird Food Resources**

The Normanton Rangers, along with the Gangalidda & Garawa Rangers, have commenced research into shorebird food resources.

In late 2017 Rangers worked with Dr. Andrew Storey of Wetlands Research & Management to undertake sampling of benthic infauna at the region's two Flyway Sites, Delta Downs and Nijinda Durlga (Tarrant). Samples were collected from mudflats around healthy mangroves and mangroves impacted

by the recent dieback. This investigation will complement on-going shorebird counts and MangroveWatch surveys undertaken by Rangers to build scientific knowledge of lower Gulf shorelines and inform best management of country.





# **Wellesley Island Rangers**

The Rangers participated in a Turtle Education field trip to Spring Point with the Grade 4 students from Mornington Island State School.

Acting Head Ranger Roy Amini talked to the students about the turtle species found on Mornington Island and their cultural importance. Ranger Clifford Yarrack then explained turtle nesting habits and how a turtle can be identified by its tracks.

Community involvement in particular with the local school is an essential and rewarding part of the job for the Wellesley Island Rangers.

CLCAC is also committed to supporting the Gulf Region Aboriginal Corporation (GRAC), Gangalidda and Garawa Native Title Aboriginal Corporation (GGNTAC) and Waanyi Native Title Aboriginal Corporation (WNTAC) as the prescribed bodies corporate (PBC).

These PBC's manage the Native Title rights and interests of the Lardil, Yangkaal, Kaiadilt, Gangalidda, Garawa and Waanyi Peoples.
